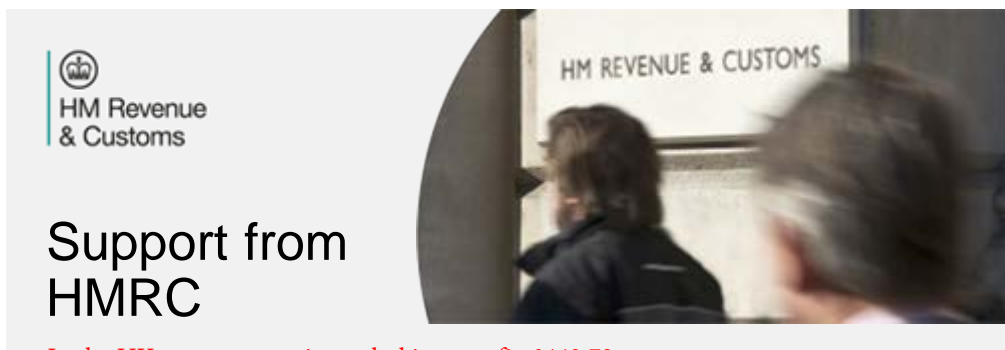


Below I have demonstrated why I know this email is a phishing fraud email.

All emails from UK government would be .gov.uk

In the UK our currency symbol is a pre-fix £440.72.
When using a suffix, it would be our currency name, Great British Pounds (GBP).
All currencies have a letter code and always shown afterwards e.g. 440.72GBP.

Dear customer,

You have a **late tax returns** due, up to **440.72 £** for late 2017.

To ensure you meet your tax obligations and get a full refund please check the link:

HMRC would not offer a REFUND when informing you of LATE TAX RETURNS.
It is far more likely to be talking about fines.
